STEP 02



THE MULTIPLAYER

The following activity will give you a chance to learn about what games they love playing with others (via their phone, tablet, computer or console) and why.

Even if your child isn't allowed to play certain games yet, or allowed to play online with others, this is still a good chance to learn about what they've heard about from friends and are keen to explore in the future themselves.

LET'S GET BUILDING

Start by reading the character description on the next page together (or ask your child to read it out loud). Be sure you have your bricks ready and start building.

While building your awesome creatures, here are some helpful icebreakers that will help you keep the conversation going.

TIP

Some kids love games meant for older players all games have a recommended age rating to ensure kids aren't exposed to very grown-up content and themes, make sure to check it out!

BUILD AND TALK

- What game are you into at the moment?
 Tell me a bit about it! Why's it so fun?
- How do you play it?
 On your phone/tablet/console/computer?
- Is it just a game for kids?
- Do you ever play with your friends online? Which ones? Do you chat during the game?
- Do you ever play with people you don't know?

 If so, how do you find people to play with?
- How do you win?
 Can you buy stuff in the game to help you do better?
- ► How did you hear about the game? From friends, online, on TV?
- What games would you like to play but haven't yet?

 Why's it so good? Do any of your friends play it?





WATCH OUT



READ BEFORE YOU BUILD

Online multiplayer games are a great way for kids to meet up with friends remotely - but in the majority of games, they will encounter others from outside their known social circle.

WHAT IS IN-GAME BULLYING?

Some gamers will do anything to win - being mean, destructive and intimidating others.

Kids unfortunately are an easy target, particularly when playing games that appeal to all ages.

TIME FOR MORE?



BUILD AND TALK

If your child doesn't play online multiplayer games yet, start with these questions:

- Has anyone ever been mean to you online?
- Have you ever seen someone get bullied online?

If yes: how did that make you feel? What did they do?

If no: I've heard people can be really mean, just for fun, in games and things, right?

Do you know what to do if you or a friend are being bullied online?

Did they fight back/retaliate? Did they report them?

If your child already plays online games:

- ► Do you ever chat to other players?

 For example, via messages or voice-chat?
- Can you tell how old someone you're playing with is?

People sometimes lie about their age and who they are when you can't see them in person!

Are the other gamers ever mean to you, or your friends?

Do gamers ever say things to you that make you feel uncomfortable?

Do they say mean, rude or inappropriate things?

Do you know what to do if someone's mean to you in a game?


It's OK to feel hurt and sad. But don't fight back! Come to me or another grown up you trust and we can tackle this together


MAKE A PACT

- Let's be kind and supportive to everyone online.
- Let's not say anything online we wouldn't say to someone's face in real life.
- Let's tell each other right away if someone's mean to us online.

WATCH OUT



READ BEFORE YOU BUILD

Everyone, whatever age they are, finds it hard to step away from their devices when they're really into a game. It's especially hard for kids!

There isn't a perfect amount of time for a child to spend online, but if you are keen to make sure they're not up all night gaming it's good to have a talk about healthy screen consumption together.

BUILD AND TALK

How much time do you think you spend playing games?

Do you think that's a lot? Which game do you find hardest to put down? It's so easy to lose track of time, isn't it?

Do you think we allow you enough time with your phone/tablet/console?

- Why do you think we limit your gaming time?
- Do you ever feel angry when we ask you to stop playing? Why is that?

How often do you think we should take breaks when playing video games?

It's good to take a break every hour so your eyes don't get tired and walk around a bit if you're sitting.

MAKE A PACT

- Let's **all** remember to take regular breaks from our screens.
- Let's make some house rules we all follow about screens.
- Let's have a 15-minute warning before you need to switch-off.

READ BEFORE YOU BUILD

Children are drawn to free games, often on phones or tablets. But a lot of so-called free games encourage players to speed up their progress by using real money to buy things like in-game currency or extra levels.

Free games aren't the only culprit, some console games encourage you to buy expensive extras too.

BUILD AND TALK

Do any of the games you like offer you stuff to buy?

Which game/s? How do you play them, on your phone/tablet/console?

- What sort of stuff can you buy in games?
 Coins, diamonds, character skins, special levels?
- Do you think those things make games better?

If you don't have them, is it as fun?

Have you ever wanted to buy them yourself?

If you really want something, let's discuss it together!

Do any games ask you to do things to get free coins or other stuff?

Like share your name or an email address?

If you were asked to fill out your real name, address, or my credit card number would you do it?

We never know where that information goes, it's best to always check with me before you do it.

MAKE A PACT

- Let's agree that if you want to buy something in your games you come to me and we can decide together if it's really worth getting.
- Let's agree that before you install a game we'll check it's not going to ask you to spend money all the time.
- Let's agree you'll never give out our names, address, email address or my credit card details online without checking with me first.






A BIG WELL DONE!
